

International depth to the London fair

Upper Street's Business Design Centre will turn into a treasure trove for art lovers and collectors from January 18 as it again plays host to London Art Fair.

Spanning the early 20th century to the present day, the 29th LAF features no fewer than 129 galleries presenting quality Modern British art alongside quality international modern and contemporary works. More than one-fifth of the 2017 exhibitors come from outside the UK, including France, Germany, South Korea, China and the US.

International contemporary galleries making their LAF debut include Pi Artworks from Istanbul, Seoul's Atelier Aki, Victor Lope Arte Contemporaneo, Barcelona, and Island 6 from Shanghai.

Nearer home, both William Crozier (1930-2011) and Henry Moore (1898-1986) will feature on the Piano Nobile (www.piano-nobile.com/) stand.

Moore's work on paper, *A Land: His Lines Follow Life Back into the Stone*, 1950, was commissioned by Jacquetta Hawkes, author and wife of JB Priestly, for her cult publication, *A Land*, and an illustration of the work was the frontispiece to the book. As the gallery points out, the work itself was in her and Priestly's collection.

In addition, the Crozier, *Untitled*,

from the 1960s is an "important early work by the Scottish-Irish artist", who is to be the subject of a major retrospective at the Irish Museum of Modern Art, Dublin, opening in July.

Crozier's work has recently been acquired by the Tate, the Imperial War Museum, and Ireland's Great Hunger Museum at Quinnipiac University, just outside New York.


Other prominent artists to be featured by Piano Nobile include Paul Nash, Mark Gertler, John Armstrong, William Coldstream, Euan Uglow, Leon Kossoff, John Golding, and Tony Cragg.

In addition to a comprehensive series of curated exhibitions, talks, tours, films and performances by experts in the field, new features and highlights for this year's fair include:

● "curiosities" from The Hanbury Collection and Knight Webb Gallery's exhibition of contemporary female artists including works by Alison Jackson, Juliane Hundertmark, Heide Hatry and Lesley Hilling.

● Crane Kalman Brighton are bringing works from the portrait photographer David Steen (1936-2015), including portraits of Elizabeth Taylor and Twiggy.

● Hanmi Gallery will present South Korean artist Jaye Moon's sculptural street art, formed from LEGO blocks, at locations throughout the show.
